**A. SUBJECT:**

**School Nursing in Idaho, Report and Recommendation**

**BACKGROUND:**

Medical needs of K-12 students in public schools have risen dramatically as least restrictive environments are accessed and increasingly complex medical treatments are performed outside of clinical settings. Traditional limited routine health services (e.g. vision screening, growth and development classes) are available for most public school students from a range of providers. Increasingly, students across the state require more involved school health services ranging from daily medication administration to full care of quadriplegic students with tracheostomies. In 1999 the U.S. Supreme Court ruled in the “Garret F.” case (Cedar Rapids Community School District v. Garret F., 1999) that all medical services required for a student to benefit from an educational program, excluding only those that require a physician, are related services under federal special education law and must be provided by public schools. The full impact of this ruling remains to be seen. Idaho does not require either school nurses or specific nursing services in public schools. Individual school districts have responded to meeting student medical needs in a variety of ways, with great disparity across the state.

**DISCUSSION:**

SNOI (School Nurse Organization of Idaho) will present a review of school nursing services in Idaho. The needs and challenges of meeting medical needs through school nursing services will be outlined. As a part of the discussion, SNOI will propose that the State Department of Education create a position of State School Nurse Consultant.


**PROPOSAL/IMPACT STATEMENT:**

The School Nurse Organization of Idaho proposes a full time position of State School Nurse Consultant be created within the State Department of Education. The fiscal impact of this position would be in the range of \$60-80,000 annually, including salary and benefits.



## **B. SUBJECT:**

### **Elementary and Secondary School Accreditation Reports**

## **BACKGROUND:**

All public schools in Idaho will be state accredited. State Accreditation is voluntary for private and parochial schools (Section 33-119, Idaho Code). Under the Administrative Rules of the State Board of Education, the State Department of Education developed the process for school personnel to report how each school is addressing the elements of "Thoroughness" and meeting the standards required for school accreditation. Schools have the flexibility to become accredited using one of the following options: Idaho Elementary/Secondary Accreditation Standards, Northwest Accreditation Standards, or School Accreditation School Improvement Model (SASI or SIP) or submitting an Alternative Accreditation Plan (AAP). School principals complete their chosen accreditation and reporting format and submit the report via the Internet to the State Department of Education by October 15.

The State Accreditation Committees represent each region of the state; members are elected by their peers and approved by the State Board of Education. The Committees meet in October to review the reports and compare the school's responses to the required standards. An accreditation rating is assigned to each school, based on how well the school meets the standards. The State Accreditation Committees have established a rating scale and a deviation rating scale for each standard.

After schools are provided their preliminary accreditation status and committee comments, they are given time to respond to any deviations from the standards. The school responses are given due consideration and a final recommendation is made to the State Board of Education.

Both the Elementary Accreditation Committee and the Secondary State/Northwest Advisory Accreditation Committee have reviewed the annual accreditation reports and ratings and submitted their accreditation rating recommendations.

### **C. SUBJECT:**

**Adoption of curricular materials and related instructional materials as recommended by the Curricular Materials Selection Committee.**

### **BACKGROUND:**

The Administrative Rules of the State Board of Education, IDAPA 08.02.03.112 describe the adoption process for curricular materials as an adoption cycle of five (5) years. Curricular materials are defined as "textbook and instructional media including software, audio/visual media and Internet resources" (Idaho Code 33-118A.) Idaho is a multiple adoption state. The Curricular Materials Selection Committee is charged with the responsibility to screen, evaluate, and recommend curricular materials for adoption by the State Board of Education.

For 2002, the main adoption cycle is for curricular materials in the subject areas of Language Arts, Part II (English, spelling, composition, grammar and usage), Communications (speech and journalism), Humanities (interdisciplinary, foreign languages, dance, music, theatre and visual art), Dictionary and Thesaurus.

In addition, the two-year interim adoption clause allowed for submissions of materials in the subject areas of Language Arts, Part I (reading and literature), Drivers Education, Science, Health Education, and Handwriting.

Computer Applications are adopted annually.

### **RECOMMENDATION:**

The State Department of Education recommends the adoption of curricular materials as outlined in Attachment 1, Curricular Materials Recommendations Book 2002.

**E. SUBJECT:**

**Requests for Approval to Transport Students Less than One and One-half Miles**

**BACKGROUND:**

Idaho Code 33-1006 states that the “State Board of Education shall determine what costs of transporting pupils, including maintenance, operation and depreciation of vehicles, insurance, payments under contract with other public transportation providers whose vehicles used to transport pupils comply with federal transit administration regulations, ‘bus testing,’ 49 C.F.R. part 665, and any revision thereto, as provided in subsection 4. of this section, or other state department of education approved private transportation providers, salaries of drivers, and any other costs, shall be allowable in computing the transportation support program of school districts.

The transportation support program of a school district shall be based upon the allowable costs of. . .

2. Transporting pupils less than one and one-half (1½) miles as provided in section 33-1501, Idaho Code, when approved by the State Board of Education.”

State Board of Education Rule IDAPA 08.02.02.190.04. states that the “State Department of Education transportation personnel will conduct an on-site review of each school district’s initial application. Each applying district will be required to reapply annually and confirm that conditions are unchanged. In order to qualify for reimbursement the local school board will, by official action, approve a safety busing request and cause the students in question to be transported before either the initial or the reapplication request is sent to the state. Consideration for reimbursement will also be contingent on the application being received by the State Department of Education Transportation Section on or before October 31. If unusual circumstances occur after the due date, new applications or amendments to previously submitted applications may be filed.”

**DISCUSSION:**

Requests from various school districts to transport students less than one and one-half miles, as provided in Section 33-1006, Idaho Code, have been

received by the State Department of Education and are submitted to the State Board of Education for consideration. New requests have been verified by an on-site inspection.

**RECOMMENDATION:**

The attachment contains a list of 94 school districts who applied for safety busing affecting 26,977 students with recommendation for approval.
