## U.S. Secret Service Research, Analysis and Key Findings of Averted and Targeted School Violence and Academic Active Shooter Trends and Tactics

For over 20 years, the U.S. Secret Service National Threat Assessment Center (NTAC) has conducted research on the thinking and behaviors of those who commit acts of targeted school violence, in an effort to prevent future acts from occurring. Key findings from this research indicate that establishing multidisciplinary threat assessment teams and encouraging school communities to report concerning behaviors are critical steps in the prevention of targeted violence.

This presentation will highlight relevant past incidents and include findings and recommendations from NTAC's latest research publications on targeted school violence and averted school attacks at K-12 schools in the United States. It will also focus on how communities can use a multidisciplinary approach to identify, assess, and intervene with students exhibiting concerning or threatening behaviors as early as possible.

The U.S. Secret Service Critical Protective Analysis Group (CPAG) will provide a briefing on Academic Active Shooter trends and tactics that affect the physical protection of soft targets and hard targets.
